CHILD AND YOUTH SERVICES TOUCH POLICY



- 1. Appropriate touching involves:
  - Recognition of the importance of physical contact to child nurturing and guidance.
  - Adult respect for personal privacy and personal space of children.
  - Responses affecting the safety and the well-being of the child, e.g. holding child's hand when crossing the street; holding a child gently but firmly during a temper tantrum.
  - Staff and volunteers modeling appropriate touching
- 2. Examples of appropriate touching include:
  - Brief hugs initiated by youth or used in comforting youth
  - Shaking hands
  - Reassuring touches on the shoulder or back
- 3. Inappropriate touching involves:
  - Coercion or other forms of exploitation of the child's lack of knowledge.
  - Satisfaction of adult needs at the expense of the child.
  - Violating a cultural taboo against sexual contact between adults and children.
  - Attempting to change child behavior with adult physical force, often applied in anger.
  - Reinforcing the concept with the child of "striking out" to respond to a problem
- 4. Examples of inappropriate touching include:
  - Forced good-bye kisses
  - Corporal punishment
  - Slapping
  - Striking or pinching
  - Prolonged tickling
  - Fondling or molestation
